The Tenth G20 Leaders Summit will be held on November 15 and 16, 2015 in Antalya, Turkey. Inclusiveness, Implementation and Investment for Growth constitute priorities on the agenda of 2015 G20 under Turkish Presidency. In order to better examine the problems faced by global economic growth and possible policy solutions therewith, and to promote communication and research cooperation amongst G20 think tanks on global governance, the 2015 G20 Think Tank Summit themed “Global Governance and Open Economy” will be convened. Representatives from think tanks of G20 member countries will be invited to the Summit to discuss and debate possible paths to strong, sustainable and balanced growth of global economy, aiming to provide feasible policy recommendations to national and world leaders. This is the third annual G20 Think Tank Summit hosted by Renmin University of China and co-organized by Chongyang Institute for Financial Studies, Renmin University of China (RDCY), Shanghai Institute for International Studies (SIIS), Institute of World Economics and Politics at Chinese Academy of Social Sciences (IWEPCASS) and Economic Policy Research Foundation of Turkey (TEPAV). The First and Second Annual G20 Think Tank Summit organized by Chongyang Institute for Financial Studies, Renmin University of China (RDCY), held respectively in August 2013 and September 2014, played an influential role during the G20 Leaders Summit in Russia and Australia, providing intellectual support for the development of G20 via the passing and publicizing of G20 Think Tank Joint Statement. 09:00–10:50 【Panel I: G20 and Global Economic Renewal】 (110 minutes)

Implementation of the Comprehensive Growth Strategy as well as meeting the growth target previously committed are the major tasks of present global economic governance. Accordingly, the host country of 2015 G20 Summit, Turkey, put forward the “3i” proposal. However, in light of the fact that the annual global growth in 2015 is expected to decrease and of the many economic happenings including the situation in Greece, achieving the global growth target in the next three years seems to be full of uncertainty. To run the G20 Summits of this year and next successfully, to better cope with uncertainty and systematic risks, and to strengthen policy coordination, there needs to be more innovative framework and policy recommendations.

11:00–12:50 【Panel II: G20, Financial Reform and Global Governance】 (110 minutes)

It has been seven years since the outbreak of global financial crisis in 2008. Contrary to being over, the crisis has now reached a deeper level. G20 has always placed the reform and governance of financial institutions at the top of its agenda. Unfortunately, a number of financial reforms have come to a halt following the blockage of IMF structural reform. Meanwhile, there have emerged many new phenomena and trends that are both fundamental and structurally significant in the global financial sector, and which are yet to be included in the discussion of G20 meetings. How to overcome the obstacles in global financial governance against the new economic



backdrop, thereby advancing the agenda of global financial reform in G20 purview, has become one of the biggest challenges confronted by the G20 mechanism.

This year, the world will be commemorating the 70th anniversary of the end of World War II. At such a critical moment for the “post-2015 agenda”, a number of fundamental changes have taken place globally. New developments of major country relations as well as incidents like the signing of the Iran Nuclear Agreement have brought fresh tasks to G20: is it necessary to reform the structure and functions of G20, or to adjust agenda setting in accordance with changes in overall situation, among others? As world order takes on new patterns, what role should G20 play? These are the questions to be examined by the highest level of policy making.
